BACKGROUND

The African Forum for Agricultural Advisory Services (AFAAS) is a Continental body that brings National Agricultural Extension and Advisory Services (AEAS) under one umbrella. The AFAAS' goal is to enhance utilization of improved knowledge, technologies and innovations by agricultural value chain actors for improving productivity oriented towards their individual and national development objectives. AFAAS Operational Plan (OP, 2018-2022) sets three major measurable objectives that are clearly linked and support its Strategy 2018-2027. A number of projects including the Comprehensive Africa Agriculture Development Programme EX Pillar 4 (CAADP-XP4) have been implemented to contribute to the achievement of the AFAAS Strategy and MTOP.

The CAADP-XP4 Project under the DeSIRA program is financed by the European Union and managed by the International Fund for Agricultural Development (IFAD). The direct beneficiaries of this action are the National Agricultural Knowledge and Innovation Systems (NAKIS) in African countries-the Country Fora (CFs) and their members. The ultimate beneficiaries are the rural poor comprising smallholder farmers, including women and youth Agripreneurship and pastoralists, as well as marginalized communities.

Leveraging the CAADPXP4 project, several national level initiatives were mapped and partnership projects initiated on CSA and agroecology. In addition, a number of activities aimed at promoting institutionalization of policies and practices of Agroecology among national level partners have been supported, including research studies. As the project, comes to an end, sustaining this momentum among the partners, while benchmarking and capturing lessons on what has been achieved is critical. In this regard, AFAAS proposes to hold a continental multi- stakeholder engagement and learning event to foster a collective stakeholder response in sustaining the scaling of agroecology and CSA practices in Africa

OBJECTIVES

The multi-stakeholder engagement and learning event seeks to:

- 1.Enhance understanding of the theory and practice of resilient and sustainable agricultural practices in supporting agri-food systems in Africa
- 2.Discuss continental initiatives on CSA and Soil Health within Context of the AARIEIs (evolution from CAADP-XPIV to AARIEIs)
- 3. Share existing TIMPs on agroecology/CSA that are promoted by the countries- the impactful case stories, studies and lessons in institutionalizing policy and practice
- 4.Identify opportunities and draw a collective roadmap for sustaining scaling of nature-based solutions in line with the NAIPs
- 5.Discuss the financial and administrative issues; and roadmap for the smooth completion of projects; including the CAADP XP4 project
